The Watch

A daily rhythm for the man who's never had one

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A man without a watch drifts. Not off a cliff. Off a shoreline, an inch at a time, until the water he's standing in isn't the water he started in and he never felt the current move him. That's how it works. Nobody wakes up one morning and decides to walk away from God. He just stops standing at his post, one day at a time, and the days add up.

Drift never levels off either. It doesn't hold steady at "fine." A man who isn't standing watch over his own soul doesn't stay neutral, he goes downhill, quietly, and usually he's the last one to notice. His wife notices. His kids notice. He tells himself he's just busy.

So here's the thing to get straight before anything else in this guide: a watch is not a performance for God. You're not earning anything. You already have everything you need in Christ. A watch is a post you keep, not a bill you pay. Grace put you on this wall. Grace is why you can still show up tomorrow after you miss it today.

1. Pick one time. Make it small enough to keep.

Jesus had a time. "In the early morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house, and went away to a secluded place, and was praying there" (Mark 1:35). Not because mornings are magic. Because He had a set post, before the day could pull Him ten directions.

Yours doesn't have to be sunrise. It has to be fixed. Same fifteen minutes, same chair, same time, every day you can manage it. Fifteen minutes you'll actually do beats sixty you'll do twice a month. Start smaller than you think you need to. You can always add time later. You can't build a habit out of a plan you keep breaking.

2. Open the Word before you open anything else

Before the phone. Before the news, the group chat, the inbox. Whatever gets your eyes first sets the tone for the rest of the day, and right now that's probably a stranger's opinion or a stranger's outrage. Trade it. Even one paragraph of Scripture, read slow, beats a feed you scrolled without remembering a word of it.

"The LORD'S lovingkindnesses indeed never cease, For His compassions never fail. They are new every morning; Great is Your faithfulness" (Lamentations 3:22-23). You don't need to earn a clean morning. You get handed one. Read it like that's true, because it is.

3. Pray before you check anything

Prayer isn't a report you file. It's a man showing up at his post and saying, "I'm here. Watching. Waiting on You." "In the morning, O LORD, You will hear my voice; In the morning I will order my prayer to You and eagerly watch" (Psalm 5:3). Notice the last word. Watch. That's not decoration, that's the whole guide in one verse.

You don't need eloquent. You need honest. Tell Him what's actually true, the dread, the temptation you already feel coming, the guy at work you can't stand. He's not grading your sentences.

4. Guard your gates

Your eyes and your phone are the gates into your soul, and most men leave them wide open all day without ever standing post there. "Watch over your heart with all diligence, For from it flow the springs of life" (Proverbs 4:23). Everything downstream, your marriage, your temper, your prayer life, comes out of what you let through those gates.

This isn't about a filter app, though get one if you need it. It's about deciding, before the moment comes, what you will not look at and where you will not scroll. A guard who decides at the gate wins easier than a guard who decides in the middle of the crowd.

5. One hard right thing

Somewhere in the day, do one thing you don't want to do because it's right. Answer the hard email honestly instead of dodging it. Apologize first. Say no to the thing that would be easy to say yes to. Small, repeated, on purpose. "Be on the alert, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong" (1 Corinthians 16:13). That word "alert" is the same watchman word from before. Paul isn't handing out a slogan. He's telling a church full of men who'd rather coast to grow up and stand.

A watch that only happens in your own head never gets tested. This is where it gets tested.

6. The evening check

Before you sleep, ask three questions. Where did I see God today? Where did I fail? What do I need to bring to Him before I close my eyes? Don't turn this into an accounting ledger where you're settling a debt. You're not squaring up with God. You're just being honest with the Man who already knows, so you can sleep with a clear conscience instead of a buried one.

"Let us draw near with confidence to the throne of grace, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Hebrews 4:16). That's what the evening check actually is. Not an audit. A man walking up to the throne with confidence, because the door's already open.

Two minutes. Out loud if you're alone, silent if you're not. Then let it go and sleep.

7. When you miss the watch, and you will

You will miss it. Not might. Will. You'll sleep through it, or life will bulldoze it, or you'll just quit for a stretch because you're tired of failing at something that was supposed to be easy. Ten times, twenty times, however many times you've started this before and stopped. That's not disqualifying. That's just a man.

"Let us not lose heart in doing good, for in due time we will reap if we do not grow weary" (Galatians 6:9). The watch you keep for thirty years is made of every watch you started over after you missed one. There's no streak to protect here. There's no scoreboard God's keeping where yesterday's miss cancels today's post. Get back up. Stand it again tomorrow. That's the whole method.

8. Find one man who knows your watch

Tell somebody what time you're standing post. A brother, your pastor, a guy from church you trust enough to be honest with. Not so he can grade you, so he can ask you. A watch nobody else knows about is a watch that's easy to abandon quietly. A watch someone else can ask you about tends to get kept.

Maybe you're reading this and you're not sure you're even on the wall yet. This whole guide assumes a man who already belongs to Christ, saved by grace through faith in Him, not by anything he's built or kept. If that's not settled for you, that comes first. Repent, believe in Jesus, and the post is yours. Everything above is what a saved man does with his days, not what an unsaved man does to get saved.

I'm not writing this so you feel bad about the ten mornings you've already missed. I'm writing it so you know exactly where the post is tomorrow. The point was never the streak. The point is Christ, and He's not waiting for you to earn your way back to the wall. He's already there. Go stand with Him.

"For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus" (Philippians 1:6). That's not your promise to keep. That's His.

The verses to have ready

Keep these where you can find them fast, in your Bible app, on a card in your truck, wherever. When you need them, you won't have time to go hunting.
